### Where is the most unlikely place you find inspiration?

#### What was your most recent purchase for your own home?

A cuckoo clock that I bought online. I've been collecting them for years and am obsessed with all the different shapes, colors and styles they come in.

#### What is the most outrageous thing a client has ever asked?

A New York-based client once called while he was on a business trip in Los Angeles. He had seen an upholstered chair that piqued his interest but insisted I see it in person. A photo or a visit to a sister showroom in Manhattan wouldn't do! So I literally hopped on a plane



that same day, looked at the chair, then flew right back to New York. Clients sometimes forget how integral patience is to a successful design process.

## What space in New York would you like to redesign and why?

New York City subway cars. Their interiors are overdue for a makeover.

#### How does your connection to Harlem—where you have a home and office—affect your designs?

The architecture and cultural richness of Harlem are astounding— • I maintain that some of the most beautiful buildings in Manhattan are there. From an interesting façade of a landmark church to a few girls jumping double Dutch in the street, its power to inspire is boundless.

#### What current trend do you hope stays around, and which old trend were you happy to see go?

I'm thrilled to see so many new outdoor furniture and fabric options! Outdoor living is now an important part of most people's lifestyles, and until very recently, there simply wasn't much to choose from. I'm happy to say good-bye to those uninspired all-white interiors—how completely boring and unoriginal!

## Given a tight budget, what's the one thing you splurge on?
