The fearlessly eclectic stuff you like best doesn't end with something cool, new, and terribly smart. In Greece is the word for the bust of Venus—like the Raynes of ancient goddesses left alone in matte black ceramic. Vase, \$400. 2. HARLEM ON HER MIND

The prints known as bunts typically depict aristocratic fantasies of country life—a far cry from Harlem, home of interior designer Sheila Bridges. "I'd always loved bunts but never saw any I could relate to personally," she says. Her wallpaper's bold, satirical images—gays playing basketball, people dancing—simultaneously honor African-American culture and remind us how it's been plagued by stereotypes.
