Don't hate Sheila Bridges because she's smart (her pedigree includes Brown University and Parsons School of Design) or because her home is beautiful. This Philadelphia native's interior design career is setting new standards for "hot." In fact, Bill Clinton recently hired her to design and decorate his Harlem office.

Bridges' home office is in Harlem, and Sean Combs and Tom Clancy are among her clients. When she wants to decompress from her stress-inducing functions in the city, she heads to her colonial farmhouse in the Hudson Valley. The house sits high, overlooking the Hudson River, and is surrounded by lilacs and enhanced by a pool and a view that goes on forever. Bridges' ineffable style adorns every nook and cranny.

After buying her hideaway three summers ago, she knew it truly needed a designer's touch: It had been hidden under '70s shag carpeting, faux wood paneling and years of bad taste.
