Our top decorators differ wildly on how they approach decorating trends. Although the majority embrace new ones passionately, others say that the idea of "being influenced by fashionable design movements" doesn't jibe with their more traditional styles. American mid-20th-century and 1940s French furniture design are pervasive trends, as are "franker colors," "the mix-and-don't-match look, and "up-to-the-minute technology and appliances."

- Dan Carithers: "Simple, luxurious fabrics, glass accessories, earthenware American pots, and French ceramics."
- Milly de Cabrol: "I adore chinoiserie accessories mixed with contemporary furniture."
- Thom Filicia: "Gold-colored metal rather than silver."
- Fisher Weisman: "The only good trend is individual, totally custom interiors that are timeless."
- Richard Keith Langham: "My old friend, clear color, has finally made a comeback!"
- John Oetgen: "Rich colors, as well as super-pale mystery colors. Also big-scale antiques."
- Miles Redd: "I'm mad for glass and mirror, and I love using it in unexpected places."
- Suzanne Rheinstein: "Solidcolored fabrics look right.
 So do hand-blocked printed materials from Cowtan & Tout and Clarence House and hand-screened fabrics by Robert Kime."
- Katie Ridder: "Lots of grass cloth and leather tiles on walls. Also, mirroring an entire ceiling with smoky glass, à la Tony Duquette."
- Daniel Romualdez: "I'm not into trends."
- David Mitchell: "More people are asking for modern interiors. This is 2001, not the 18th century!"
- Brian Murphy: "New technology—it's the biggest trend in decorating."
